Description

This course focuses on experiential learning: this is a research and field work oriented study abroad on social, cultural, political and scientific dimensions of sustainability issues in France. Field. Work. Study. Abroad. This course is designed to take students' international studies on sustainability deeper: be immersed in an environment conducive to students' academic goals, give them real-life, hands-on experience. Students will be "learning by doing" (interviews, projects based on visits, field trip organization) and group research projects. The benefit of field work study abroad is to get to break free from the classroom and learn in new environments—explore further afield... in French!

Description of Graded Components

- 1. Field trips/excursion organization + Finals (30%)
- 2. Activités & Projects (35%)
- 3. Serving + Reports on activity (blog/website posts) (35%)

SERVE: Interact with locals in Metz through service-learning projects that encourage true French language immersion and community action. At least once a week for a total of at least 3 hours per week, students are required to go to the city of Metz. Students will be invited to do interviews, photographs, videos, and other directed activities and use them in their weekly reports.

<u>Reports on activity (weekly reports/website posts) (35%):</u> you will report on your activity and your service-learning projects via weekly reports on Canvas; you will then post some of them on the website. Posts requirements: 250-500 words (with pics or art) or small video.

LEARN: Students will be "learning by doing" (interviews, projects based on visits, field trip organization) and group research projects.

<u>Field trips/excursion organization (30%):</u> you will participate in field trips in groups. FIELD TRIPS ARE <u>NOT</u> OPTIONAL UNLESS INDICATED BY THE PROFESSOR.

Field trips are part of the program. All students are expected to attend all classes and field trips.

SUSTAIN: Focus on the region's sustainability effort, including the fight against climate change, preservation of the region's biodiversity and natural resources, and improving the quality of life of the city's inhabitants.

Activities (15%): participate in all class activities and create your own in groups or individual. See Canvas.

<u>Project 1 (10%)</u>: Present to the class what you are doing and/or what you will be in your "serving" section of the course. Reminder: this is part of your <u>homework</u> and you should do 3 hours a week. Conclusion of your volunteering action to be posted on Canvas at the end of the semester as "Final report".

<u>Project 2 (10%):</u> What should be done at GTL to improve sustainability in or around the building for GTL community? What is missing? What needs to be done? How can we imagine a better and more sustainable GTL? Group Project. Present in class with images, graphics, videos, when done, post on Canvas. Be creative. Explore.

<u>COMPLETION OF THE THREE PARTS OF THE PROGRAM (SERVE -voluntary work /check in / reports. LEARN - field trips. SUSTAIN -develop projects. IS MANDATORY TO PASS THE COURSE</u>

Note that your active participation in all activities is crucial and will help to determine your final grade.

Collaboration & Group Work

In this course, group work is an essential part and is encouraged. Teamwork born of field work study abroad challenges students to develop soft skills, such as communication, leadership, and friendship. You will be doing group projects, that means your social and interpersonal skills will grow tremendously as well as your cross-cultural sensitivities. That also means you can also help your fellow classmate with solving a problem, or organize an activity.
